

LOBBYIST REPORT: ELECTION SEASON IS OVER

Squeezing the Lemon, One Last Time

It seems like this year's elections have been going on forever. It also seems as though the pervasiveness of the election was like nothing we'd ever seen before. So many emails, phone calls, mailers, and text messages....

You remember being told that this was, "The most consequential election of our lifetime," right? And the reason you were told that may have had a basis in fact, but you have to dig deeper. Why did both parties want you to have a fear of missing out if you didn't vote?

The reason is that small changes make a big difference. Let's start with the idea that Wisconsin ranks among the top states when it comes to voter turnout. In fact, in 2020, nearly 86 percent of us voted. For comparison, no other state cracked 80 percent. Oklahoma's voter turnout was a full 30 percentage points less than ours.

In Wisconsin, you're trying to squeeze the last little bit of juice out of the lemon, and that takes a whole lot of pressure, and that's what all the fuss was about.

Since 2016, 400,000 more Wisconsinites have been voting in presidential elections. In 2016, the new voters broke for Trump. In 2020, for Biden. And this year, for Trump again. We are truly a battleground state, with each election relying on 1 or 2 percentage points of increased turnout, and less than 1 percentage point difference.

Nationwide, the opportunity to recruit new voters is much higher than in Wisconsin. In fact, among the seven key battleground states this year, Michigan was our closest competitor for turnout at 73 percent. That trickles down to as low as 64 percent in Nevada. It's just harder to find new voters here, and in an election where the division among the candidates at the top of the tickets was so stark, and so many people had made their choice so early on, the target was new voters.

In the past, the general idea was that Democrats won high turnout elections and Republicans won low turnout elections. That's no longer true. Both sides have effective ground games in place in our state and can get to historically high turnout for their candidates. The question is, can they get just a few more?

And that's the story. In almost every Congressional District, you see 400,000 votes cast, plus or minus a few.

Compared to 2020, the numbers are within a few thousand. But 2,000 in one district and 5,000 in another, of new voters breaking your way, and you win the race.



What's interesting too, in our state, is the willingness of voters to split their ticket. In 2022, Tony Evers won and so did Ron Johnson. This year, Donald Trump won, and so did Tammy Baldwin. It's not a lot of voters who split tickets, but enough to swing elections.

Implications

On the federal level, it's too early to tell about control of the House. First, there are races where there are counts and recounts happening. But even if Republicans gain control, it's unlikely that they will have a significant majority. That means that just a few votes can wreak havoc on plans to move legislation or to move it quickly. We've seen this last session, when a slim majority created problems for two Speakers – Kevin McCarthy and Mike Johnson. Whether the caucus will work together or not remains to be seen. For sure, there are key parts of the agenda that will move, but there may be some more controversial pieces that will meet with resistance.

And even if they pass the House, Republicans picked up a couple of seats in the Senate, but not enough to be filibuster proof, which would require 60 seats to be in their control. The filibuster is just a rule, not part of the Constitution, so it can be set aside, but there's a lot of tradition favoring its continuation.

That means that there will be legislative progress, but that the expectation should be much higher for action from the Executive Branch. There, you can see swift action of federal rules, agency funding and staffing (eliminating Civil Service), foreign policy (Israel and Ukraine being the prime examples), and border control. Tariffs too, as that is an Executive Branch responsibility as is some of the energy policy, such as drilling restrictions.

You can expect an extension of the tax cuts passed in 2017, though not necessarily additional cuts. That remains to be seen. So, if your business has been wondering about the phase-out of the Qualified Business Income Deduction *Lobbyist Report continued on next page*

or the 21 percent rate, that likely won't happen now. Nor will we likely see an increase in the estate tax.

Training grants will still be available, but their structure may look different under the new administration, with fewer restrictions on how and when they can be used, though possibly with less funding.

And before any of that happens, beginning in early 2025, there is still a debt ceiling discussion, continuing resolutions, a bill on FEMA's supplemental funding for disaster relief, national defense authorization, and the Farm Bill to address this session. It's still going to be a volatile time, even with the elections over.

Wisconsin Elections

Closer to home, not much is going to change. The Governor has two years left on his term and Republicans still control both chambers. The only real change is that a Republican veto-proof majority is no longer a possibility given the redistricting that took place prior to the election.

Democrats picked up seats in both chambers as a result of redistricting and may be within striking distance of taking

control of one or both chambers when the 2026 elections are held. During mid-term elections (halfway through the presidential term), the opposition party – the Democrats, in 2026 – tend to pick up more seats across all elections than does the party in power.

What that means is that a lot will be riding on the top of the ticket in Wisconsin in 2026. Evers will not be running again, so both parties will be offering up fresh faces and ideas during the primaries, hoping one can capture the imagination of voters and ride a wave into office, pulling their party with them.

NR 146/NR 812 - An Update

The 146/812 Code Committee will meet next on November 13. If the committee work ends this Fall, as planned, the rule will be drafted, then go to two public hearings – one to discuss the fiscal impact and the second to consider the text of the rule. After that, three legislative committees before it is finally implemented. In other words, there's still a way to go.

Please stay in touch with WWWA regarding your thoughts on the rule changes. We want to provide valuable testimony at the hearings, and the best way to do that is to hear from all of you.

NR 140

Work on standards under NR 140 is on hold following a fiscal estimate that came in high enough to require additional legislative oversight. Until that happens, the DNR cannot continue working on the rule. More on this in 2025.

Federal Regulations Struck Down, Delayed By Courts

Two rules that would have affected business owners were struck down by courts recently, causing their implementation to be delayed. The new administration will determine whether to try to fix the rules to be compliant with the judges' orders or, more likely, set the rules aside permanently, meaning no action is required now or at any future time.

The first rule would have been effective January 1 and would have affected required overtime, expanding the number of workers who would be eligible to include most salaried workers making less than \$1,128 per week.

The second rule related to a requirement for new businesses and existing business to register under the Corporate Transparency Act. The stated intent of the bipartisan legislation was to find ways to identify and address shell corporations that are used to shelter money for terrorist organizations. Registration took about 10 minutes, for those who filed before the December 31 deadline. No filing is required at this time.

The Corporate Transparency Act – Have You Completed YOUR Required Report?

Effective January 1, 2024, a new federal law went into effect and an important deadline is approaching fast!

Under the Corporate Transparency Act, a bill that was passed by the U.S. Congress with bipartisan supermajorities, an existing business must register under the program by January 1, 2025. The stated intent is to address shell corporations used to shelter money used in terrorist organizations.

All new businesses created after January 1, 2024, must be registered within 90 days. Businesses will file a Beneficial Ownership Information Report with the Financial Crimes Enforcement Network. Any changes to filed documents must be made within 30 days of the change. The new legislation requires multi-layered corporations to peel back the layers of ownership.

Filing is easy, taking 10-15 minutes and requiring proof of identification for those filing (driver's license, passport, etc.). Talk with your lawyer or accountant for more information.

As fall is here it's looking for a job to put the rig up where I could be deer hunting off the tower. I always wanted to do


that, but getting to dam old to climb the tower.

MARKETING MATTERS: BACK TO BASICS

important is measuring the ad dollars accurately.

When your ad spend is too

fragmented and in too many

places, how are you able to measure what is working?

The title of this article

is Back to Basics. Think

about the first few years

you were in business. You

likely agonized over every

single dollar spent. You

weighed your decisions

carefully. You said "yes" to very few opportunities.

Now, 5, 10, 20 years later,

Quiz Time! If I were to ask you to list every place you spend your marketing or advertising dollars annually, could you? Most business owners and marketing managers will list the larger ticket items. But wait, there's more! What about things like: the church bulletin, little league team sponsorships, the business card ads on the menus at your favorite Supperclub? Yes, those are marketing dollars too!

Every advertising dollar counts. Collectively, it all adds up. After years of continuing to pay for these small ad space opportunities, adding a little here and a little there, you'll soon find that your marketing spend has tripled yet the return on those dollars is likely declining.

Keeping track of your ad dollar distribution is incredibly

of exposure to the audience most likely to do business with you and you are on your way to a very comprehensive and measurable campaign. Traditional PLUS Digital = Tradigital.

Bonus Business Bites:

In a meeting with a business owner recently, we asked the question "Where do you advertise?" We wrote down the list, adding annual dollars spent to each product. Then

Here's a crazy idea. Say "NO" to everything and start rebuilding your marketing strategy one campaign at a time. Get back to basics. Keep in mind the Tradigital approach we've talked about in the past. Traiditional Media advertising, namely Broadcast TV, can be the most efficient way to share your message to the masses. 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

1. Go native

Use native plants in your landscape. They look great, and don't need much water or fertilizer. Also choose grass varieties for your lawn that are adapted for your region's climate, reducing the need for extensive watering or chemical applications.

2. Reduce chemical use

Use fewer chemicals around your home and yard, and make sure to dispose of them properly - don't dump them on the ground!

3. Manage waste

Properly dispose of potentially toxic substances like unused chemicals, pharmaceuticals, paint, motor oil, and other substances. Many communities hold household hazardous waste collections or sites – contact your local health department to find one near you.

4. Don't let it run

Shut off the water when you brush your teeth or while shaving, and don't let it run while waiting for it to get cold. Keep a pitcher of cold water in the fridge instead.

5. Fix the drip

Check all the faucets, fixtures, toilets, and taps in your home for leaks and fix them right away, or install water conserving models.

6. Wash smarter

Limit yourself to just a five-minute shower, and challenge your family members to do the same! Also, make sure to only run full loads in the dish and clothes washers.

7. Water wisely

Water the lawn and plants during the coolest parts of the day and only when they truly need it. Make sure you, your family, and your neighbors obey any watering restrictions during dry periods.

8. Reduce, reuse, and recycle

Reduce the amount of "stuff" you use and reuse what you can. Recycle paper, plastic, cardboard, glass, aluminum and other materials.

9. Natural alternatives

Use all natural/nontoxic household cleaners whenever possible. Materials such as lemon juice, baking soda, and vinegar make great cleaning products, are inexpensive, and environmentallyfriendly.
