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LOBBYIST REPORT: SO, WHAT HAPPENS NEXT?

A couple of weeks back, I was invited to present a government relations update to a contractor group. Then, and now, I'm tempted to focus on matters of the state, and ignore what's happening at the federal level. After all, the extent of my lobbying reach is Madison, for the most part. Groups like NGWA are your voice in Washington, DC.

Still, it's hard to ignore the context of the times in which we are living. So, let's look at Madison, then broaden our view. Chances are, some of what's happening in Madison will become inexorably entwined with changes in our federal government, so it's unlikely we'll be able to separate the two completely.

Better buckle up for this one, folks. It's going to be a bumpy ride...

State Matters

Indeed, state matters are going to matter more than ever. And already, we are wading into the waters of changes at the federal level.

In his State of the State and Budget Address, Governor Evers made it clear that Wisconsin would not be moving away from its commitments to education and mental health, and he talked about Wisconsin stepping into a greater role when it comes to things like sensible gun laws, reducing the cost of child care and prescription drugs, and to things like affordable healthcare, reproductive rights, clean energy, and LGBTQ rights.

There's not a whole lot of direct impacts on our industry. Matters of water and the environment were hardly mentioned, and event the economy – including the rural economy – was largely ignored in this year's gubernatorial addresses. He did talk about employment, but mostly in the context of apprenticeship – which is something we are working toward, but don't have in place just yet.

The Budget

A budget is a financial representation of your goals for the next year or two, and the Governor delivered his budget to the legislature in February. And they immediately declared it dead on arrival, rejecting the Governor's plan for one of their own. That's pretty typical when there's a mixed government, and not altogether unheard of even when the governor and the legislature are from the same party.

But there will be some kind of agreement eventually. They'll negotiate common ground from a good place – a multi-billion-dollar surplus.

The fundamental question is, what do you do with the money? Republicans say, "give it back" in the form of tax cuts. Democrats say, "give some of it back, but invest the balance in programs/services that can help all of society." So, there's an agreement that will include some sort of tax cut, and likely some additional investments through increased spending.

But there will always be an eye toward what's next. That's what the government is there for – to help parse through those sorts of decisions. What's next when that surplus is gone? Do we have to raise taxes? And what's next if lower tax rates can't support ongoing operations as costs rise? And will the economy perform at the projected levels and what's next if it doesn't? Government is about exactly the debate playing out in Madison – how do we balance today with tomorrow?

Remember, with redistricting, the balance of power is more equal in the legislative branch. And with mid-term elections generally favoring the party not in power in DC, both parties have to be mindful of the fact that the Senate and Assembly could both be in play in 2026, meaning one or both of the chambers could flip for the first time in more than a decade.

Wisconsin Elections

And speaking of flipping, there is an election happing this Spring for the Wisconsin Supreme Court. Whoever wins that seat will have a great deal to say about the direction of the Court. These are non-Partisan elections, but let's not kid ourselves. There are conservatives and liberals in the race, and they are each being backed by powerful interests who hope that winning that seat can alter the direction of Wisconsin for at least as long as the next election for the Court.

Regardless of who wins, the fact that there is so much money pouring into the state from outside our borders suggests that the stakes are remarkably high, despite the Court's jurisdiction being limited to matters that only really affect Wisconsin. At some point, people in Wisconsin need to either push back on the outside forces,

or accept that they are the new normal, with millions being spent to elect officials who rarely make more than six figures.

NR 146/NR 812 - An Update

The 146/812 Code Committee continues to meet and, if all goes as planned, its work will be complete this Fall. There will still be public hearings, legislative, and NR Board reviews, so we're not there yet. Please stay in touch with WWWA regarding your thoughts on the rule changes. We want to provide valuable testimony at the hearings, and the best way to do that is to hear from all of you.

NR 140/EPA and PFAS

Work on NR 140 is on hold following a fiscal estimate that came in high enough to require additional legislative oversight. Until that happens, the DNR cannot continue working on the rule. Even as that happens, the federal EPA has announced that it will no longer develop PFAS standards for drinking water, something that would have dramatically changed the landscape for state regulators, who would need to comply with the federal standards within two years. What that means is that the State's current standards will remain in place for a while.

Federal Changes

And finally, let's look at changes at the federal level.

Pretty much as soon as this is written, it will be obsolete. That's because there has been a tornado of Executive Orders and court cases to respond to those orders. There have been proposals made and withdrawn within days of one another, and a lot of statements made to open negotiations, but not necessarily reflect an acceptable, final solutions.

If disruption is your thing, you have to love it. If stability is your thing, this has been a challenging couple of months. Generally, the business community has wanted change, but they have wanted predictable change. They're getting change, but struggling to figure out how to respond to the pace of change or to know that the change is done, so they can settle into a new reality.

For our industry, tariffs are one of those changes. They will affect the cost of steel, for certain. They have been introduced and placed on hold and reintroduced, and it's hard to know what's next. Will they continue? Will other countries respond in a way that makes the tariffs disappear? Will other countries escalate a trade war?

And how will the economy respond? The initial response to the implementation of the tariffs has resulted in a whole lot of nervous investors who saw their portfolios slashed by 4 and 5 percent in just a few days. Will the market

rebound? And if so, when? And will the market signal other changes in the economy, such as changes in the interest rates, the cost of fuel, the availability of skilled labor? It's pretty hard to know.

If you're looking for crystal ball answers, they're hard to find. Someone once said that historians are better at predicting the past than predicting the future, so looking at the past may not tell us much about the future. But we have travelled this path before, in the late 19th and early 20th century. It's that part of our nation's history that we all sort of ignored, after Reconstruction and before World War II. It's worth revisiting if that's your thing. It was a period of time marked by an Industrial Revolution and a Gilded Age. By trust busting and strikes. By immigration bans and expansion of our footprint around the world. By the creation of National Parks, by a global pandemic, and by a world war that made the United States a global power, something we'd never really bargained for.

Like most things, it was a period of time that was better for some and worse for others, largely depending on your perspective and station in life. What we know is that, as a nation, we survived to become who we are today. So, even if every issue isn't identical, we're clearly at a similar inflection point, asking who we are as a nation. If the future was decided by people who lived in the past, keep in mind, we are those people to our children and our children's children. It's up to us...



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DNR UPDATES

WAMS TRANSITION TO MYWISCONSIN ID COMING SOON

The Wisconsin Web Access Management System (WAMS) will be replaced by MyWisconsin ID in the summer of 2025. This change only affects the login process, NOT the workflow after logging in.

What Is MyWisconsin ID?

MyWisconsin ID allows users to securely access various participating online state services using one username and password. Website: https://det.wi.gov/Pages/MyWisconsin_ID_Self_Registration.aspx

What Does The Change Mean For Me?

- You will need to self-register for a MyWisconsin ID account to prepare for the transition. Continue using your WAMS login until you are prompted to use your MyWisconsin ID login information.
- Users cannot share accounts, as signing in will require multi-factor authentication. Multi-factor authentication is an electronic security process requiring users to prove their identity using two verification methods.
- Users who use the Switchboard to sign in to DNR reporting services will notice a temporary change to the Switchboard webpage.

Temporary Switchboard Change

Because DNR switchboard applications are moving to MyWisconsin ID at different times, you will need to determine whether you should log in through MyWisconsin ID or WAMS. It will be best to use the Switchboard webpage rather than any bookmarked links you may be using.

- On the Switchboard webpage, look for the bullet point with the system you want to log into. It will be located under the section that indicates you should sign in through MyWisconsin ID or WAMS.
- If users previously bookmarked the WAMS page, you may see a link redirecting you to the Switchboard page. These changes are temporary until all DNR systems have migrated to MyWisconsin ID.

Linking MyWisconsin ID To WAMS Data

When WAMS officially transfers to MyWisconsin ID in the summer of 2025, users will need to link their MyWisconsin ID to their WAMS data.

When prompted, users should click 'transfer' and enter their old WAMS login information so their WAMS data and

roles can link to MyWisconsin ID. IMPORTANT: Facilities that previously shared a WAMS account should coordinate who will 'transfer' the WAMS data. Coordination is important because the WAMS data can only be claimed once by one user.

Well drillers and pump installers subscribed to DNR email updates will be notified when the transition to MyWisconsin ID has happened. Email DNRDGPrivateWaterWebSupport@wisconsin.gov if you would like be added to the DNR pump installer or well driller email updates list.

NEW ROUND OF ARPA WELL GRANTS

On January 28, 2025, Governor Evers and the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) announced a new round of American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) Well Grants to support the replacement, reconstruction, treatment or abandonment of contaminated private and non-community wells. The program will provide up to \$5 million for grants and has the same income eligibility requirements as the previous round of grants. The DNR began accepting applications for the new round of grants on February 3, 2025.

Eligibility Criteria:

- For a contaminated well serving a residence, family income may not exceed \$100,000 for the prior calendar year.
- For a contaminated non-community public system well, business income may not exceed \$100,000 for the prior calendar year.
- Determining contamination:
- One sample from a certified lab that exceeds a primary drinking water standard, two samples for fecal bacteria.

Award Amounts:

- The maximum award amount under the program will be \$16,000.
- The cost share requirement under the program will be \$0.

Other Important Information And Contacts:

- Grant applications will be accepted until August 31, 2025, or until funds run out.
- All work associated with these grants must be completed by July 31, 2026.
- Reimbursement requests must be submitted to the DNR. All grants will need to be paid out by December 31, 2026.
- Application materials are available on the ARPA Well Abandonment Grant Program webpage and the ARPA Well Compensation Grant Program webpage.
- Questions about the program can be sent to DNRARPAWellGrants@wisconsin.gov.

 The DNR has an email list to sign up to receive updates about the program. Interested parties can sign up to receive these updates. Under the "Grants and Loans" category, check the box next to "ARPA Well Grant."

To Help Get Payment Quickly:

The DNR needs to inspect the well and pump installation prior to payment. Notify your regional water supply specialist as soon as all well construction and pump installation activities are completed.

Submit the well construction report for the new well and the abandonment report for the old well promptly.

Make sure that the well owner receives your invoice and sends in their payment claim when all the work is done. We can't make payment until we receive a claim from the awardee.

This session with provide an explanation on how OSHA prioritizes job sites inspections and what happens when we conduct inspections. Trenching hazards will be discussed along with the standard to prevent trench collapses. Other hazards relating to digging or drilling will be discussed.

25-005 Bacteria and Microorganisms

Michael Schnieders, Water Systems Engineering, Inc.

The session will serve to educate the audience on the natural occurrence of bacteria in groundwater wells and also what the presence of certain bacteria and microorganisms can tell us about the well's stability and need for maintenance. The information will be based on evaluation of active municipal and residential wells across the USA.

25-006 Water Well Development Water Well Development, Jim Hutmacher, Wyo-Ben

This session offers a comprehensive overview of the well development process, covering key preparatory steps such as using drill fluids, PAC polymers, and chlorine for gravel packing, as well as flushing techniques. Participants will learn the critical components of development, including removing mud and drill fluids, enhancing permeability, and eliminating fine particles near the well bore. Emphasis will be placed on the importance of thorough development to ensure long-term well performance, optimal production, and water quality. Attendees will gain insights into

determining when and how much development is required, effective bidding strategies, and the best methods for achieving success, from air lifting to over-pumping. This training is essential for professionals seeking to maximize well efficiency and ensure high-quality outcomes.

25-007 Understanding Centrifugal Pump Curves Tom Beran, Headwater Wholesale

This course will include a brief overview of a basic pump curve with a greater understanding of the more advanced elements within the curves, an understanding of this information and how it affects the application of the pump. This information includes but is not limited to; understanding Total Dynamic Head (TDH), Flow, Net Positive Suction Head (NPSH), minimum flow, maximum flow, deadhead, efficiency, effects of larger vs small diameter impellers, effects of varying a pump's speed and how understanding this information as applying it can have real effect on the service life of a centrifugal (submersible) pump.

25-010 10 Things You Need to Know Bernie Friedenfels, Bernie's Well & Water

This session will focus on the essential steps for evaluating the safety, performance, and condition of water wells. This session will cover critical aspects such as adhering to code (NR 812), DNR resources, coordinating the business side of the inspection, assessing water quality, and identifying signs of wear, contamination, or structural issues. •

RAYMOND "RAY" HOFMAN


July 16, 1969 - April 13, 2025

February 14, 1938 - April 15, 2025


